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Reading strategy: Visualizing

Precious has been up all night with a stomachache so she is left home alone when the rest of her family goes to plant corn. Before her brother leaves he takes her aside and tells her about Prunella the Boo Hag. He tells Precious about Prunella and he makes Prunella sound awfully bad, but he doesn't really describe her physical looks. However, from her character traits the reader can't help but visualize someone quite ugly. (This is the end of the 2nd page) Have the students draw Prunella the Boo Hag. After they have had time to complete their drawings, read the remainder of the story. The students will see that their pictures of the Boo Hag might not be what they thought she would look like.

6 – Trait: Voice

The repetitive theme, "I could do that!" gives this book distinct voice. Nothing seems to be too much for Esther Morris. How many times do children hear, "Wait until you are older." and "You can't do that" Ask the students to make a list of things they want to do and have been told they can't. Discuss their lists. Are there good reasons why they can't do the things they want to do?

If you have **World Book Online** go to "Surf the Ages." Choose, Modern Times. Choose Daily Dispatch: Elizabeth Cady and Lucretia Mott. Copy this interview and have students read this script like a play. This short article will complement this book.

Vocabulary: There are some political words in this story that students might not be familiar with. List these words on the board. After reading the story go over the list. Students might have picked up the meaning of these words from the context of the story.

Word list: constitution; amendment, territorial elections; legislature; candidates; proclamation; bill; legislators; justice of the peace; docket
